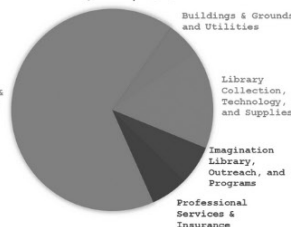
- Thanks to a generous donation, we added a 3-D printer and a Cricut vinyl cutting machine, expanding our hands-on technology services.

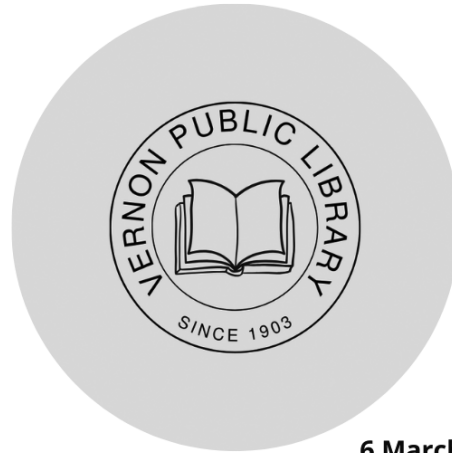

The Vernon Public Library has been serving our community since 1903. It is currently located in the Old Carriage House which was gifted to the library board in 1962. With the season of spring and new life upon us, we want to ask you to consider keeping the history of the Vernon Public Library alive when choosing where to make a donation to this year.

The Vernon Public Library is an association library dedicated to serving the citizens of our community. We offer a wide variety of resources ranging from free reading material, free wifi, classes, meeting rooms, community hub space, and more.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT NEWS

Dear Town of Vernon Residents,

My name is Timothy Murphy and I am the Highway Superintendent. I take extreme pride in serving our community to make our roads safe for everyone while doing everything I can to manage the highway budget with the focus of keeping tax dollars low. I would also like to thank all of the residents for your cooperation and patience during this winter season! Below you will find a friendly reminder of information to take note of and a list of Annual Events and other Highway News.

ROAD CONSTRUCTION: SLOW DOWN AND MOVE OVER

Day in and day out, our highway workers are putting their lives on the line in order to maintain and upgrade the roads you drive. Your local highway crew is an integral part of your community. They are responsible for keeping roads clear, repairing damage, managing traffic, and ensuring that essential transportation routes remain accessible for everyone, from daily commuters to emergency responders!

Below are some friendly tips and reminders to help keep them safe.

- JUST LIKE FOR POLICE, PLEASE SLOW DOWN AND MOVE OVER- IT'S THE LAW.
- As soon as you see lights, vests or reflectors, check traffic around you. SLOW DOWN and MOVE OVER.
- Highway workers are not there to inconvenience you, they are trying to do their job.
- Don't assume the operator can see you
- Wait until the flagger gives permission to safely pass

PLEASE REMIND YOURSELF WHEN YOU'RE IN A HURRY, THESE WORKERS ARE SOMEONE'S SON, DAUGHTER, FATHER, MOTHER, BROTHER OR SISTER! DON'T BE THE REASON THEY DON'T GET HOME.

ANNUAL EVENTS

BRUSH PICK UP – 2X a year

- First full week of May and first full week of September is brush and weeds pick up. Once you have placed all of your material roadside call the highway garage (315) 829-2742 and give your address. This will make scheduling of pickup more efficient for all. The Village of Vernon, City of Sherrill and Village of Oneida Castle have their own designated brush removal systems.
- We do have a site available at the highway garage at 4322 Churton Road for town residents to bring small limbs, leaves and grass clippings during warm weather.
- The Town does **NOT** accept Commercial green waste. These contractors are paid by the homeowner to remove their brush; therefore, they have to dispose at facilities that accept it, not at the Town. The Town's green waste site is limited in size and it can't handle the excessive amount that commercial green waste brings.

Not so fast!

Why can't the local highway department change the speed of the road?

Speed limits are set for very specific reasons and before making a change, residents and municipalities must conduct a speed study to prove a reason for change. Setting speed limits too low actually can decrease safety as drivers tend to violate speeds that are not properly set.

Who sets the speed of the road?

Most speed limits on Town and County roads are controlled by the NYS Department of Transportation (NYSDOT). NYS Vehicle & Traffic law gives the authority to set speed limits to:

- Villages & Cities
- Counties and Towns within towns whose population is over 50,000 or is designated by law as "suburban."

Note that all changes in speed limit must be done AFTER a study by a licensed professional engineer.

How can the community ask for a speed study?

For roads where the speed limit is set by NYSDOT:

- Create a petition to the town board requesting they look at improvements to traffic safety. Don't just ask for a lower speed limit.
- The board will review the request and if there appears to be a need, they will ask the County Highway Superintendent to endorse the request.
- The request will be forwarded to NYSDOT who will conduct a speed study.

For roads and streets where the municipality can set the speed limit, the study will be conducted by an engineer working for or hired by the municipality. A proper speed study will look at safety issues as well.

A speed study involves:

- **Bringing key community members together;** such as residents, highway officials, police, and school district reps to discuss the issue
- **Conducting a site visit & gathering data;** including traffic speeds and counts plus crash info
- **Meeting to discuss the findings;** share concerns and brainstorm solutions
- **Creating a plan;** such as community education, enforcement, structural changes, or speed limit changes

Keeping an open mind; if the first solution doesn't work be flexible, this is a process that takes time & patience. Lowering the speed is just one possible outcome

Some possible outcomes:

- ◇ Changing the speed limit to match both driver expectations and the surrounding community. Note the lowest speed limit outside a school zone is 25mph
- Suggesting other measures such as traffic calming, more enforcement, or and overall local roads safety plan may be a better fit than changing the speed limit.

How long does a speed study take?

- NYSDOT will need to collect data and visit the site to review conditions. Depending on the time of year, this can take several months. This is not a quick fix, please be patient.

TOWN OF VERNON PARK WALKING TRAIL MEMORIAL

Come out and see all the new trees planted in memory of loved ones at the Walking Trail behind the Town of Vernon Office Building!! To date there have been 40+ trees purchased by local community members and planted behind the town offices.

Our Town Officials feel it is important to have a safe location for our community to gather, walk, ride bikes or just enjoy the outdoors. They have recently placed a gazebo in the back portion of the park for people to take a break and enjoy our beautiful sunrises or sunsets. We are considering doing a memorial bench program and hopefully will have more information soon. There will be two doggy waste bag dispensers added at the start of both paths this spring to help the community to keep our paths free of dog waste. Anyone with any ideas or suggestions on how or what they would like to be added to beautify the park, please reach out to a Town Board Member.

The Town is excited to announce expansion of our Tree Memorial Park Program for anyone interested in honoring a friend, family or loved one. We have a new listing of trees to choose from. We are also considering a shrub and perennial option to be purchased and placed within the park. This is a fabulous way to give a living tribute for decades to come. Below is a list of the new tree options available!

The forms will be available at the Town Office Building. All trees, shrubs and perennials will be planted during the proper season to optimize survival and growth. Every option chosen will include a plaque commemorating the person/persons.

Red Maple, Sugar Maple, Northern Red Oak, London Plane, Imperial Sunburst Locust, Flowering Crab, Flowering Pear, Norway Spruce, White Pine

TREE MEMORIAL

Come out and see all the new trees planted in memory of loved ones at the Walking Trail behind the Town of Vernon Office Building!!

In recent years it has become a trend to memorialize loved ones through planting of trees. The Town is excited to announce a Tree Memorial Park Program where anyone interested in memorializing a family, friend or loved one may purchase a tree to be planted at the Town of Vernon Memorial Park. This is a fabulous way to give a living tribute for decades to come.

The forms will be available at the Town Office Building to select what type and size of tree you would like planted. All trees will be planted during the proper season to optimize survival and growth. Each tree that is planted will include a ground plaque commemorating the person/persons for that tree.

TOWN OF VERNON ASSESSOR NEWS

For the 2025 school year the VVS School District has increased their income limit for eligibility to receive the Senior Exemption on your VVS school tax bill. With that being said, I felt this would be a good time to review all the eligibility information for the 2025 Town of Vernon exemptions. They are as follows:

Basic STAR – Renews automatically- available for primary residence of all homeowners with income less than \$500,000. Anyone that purchased their home after June of 2016 must apply for the STAR Income Credit with the State of New York. (see contact info below)

Enhanced STAR – Renews automatically – available to homeowners 65 or older with income less than \$107,300. This benefit is also in the form of a credit if you purchased your home after June of 2016, anyone receiving the **Basic STAR** prior to June of 2016 has the option of applying for the STAR Credit through the state or they can apply for the Enhanced STAR exemption with the Town of Vernon Assessors Office. (see contact info below)

Please note: to receive either of the above STAR credits, Basic or Enhanced, you must apply for the initial year. To do so, you can apply for the Credit by calling the NYS STAR office at 518-457-2036 or you can apply online at <https://www.tax.ny.gov/pit/property/star/default.htm>.

Veteran and Veteran Disability Exemptions – Renews Automatically but you must apply with the Assessor for the initial year (if you receive the disabled Veteran’s exemption and your percentage of disability changes, you must bring your paperwork to the assessor’s office so your exemption can be updated).

Senior Citizen’s Exemption: To be eligible for the Senior Citizen’s exemption a resident must prove ownership, must be at least 65 years of age, prove that their income falls within the scale approved by the taxing jurisdiction and prove that the property is their primary residence. Below are Senior Exemption income limits for some jurisdictions that are in the Town of Vernon:

Oneida County and Town of Vernon:	Income less than \$37,900
VVS School District:	Income less than \$37,900
Oneida School District:	Income less than \$19,500

The Senior Citizen’s exemption **must be renewed each year** with the Town of Vernon Assessor. Once you have initially applied for this exemption you will receive a pink renewal form in the mail every January.

Low Income Disability Exemption: This exemption applies to the Oneida County and Town of Vernon taxes. Income must be less than \$37,900 and you must have proof of your disability. Once you have initially applied for this exemption you will receive an orange renewal form in the mail every January.

Agricultural Exemption: The Town of Vernon does have an Agricultural Exemption for farmers and landowners who lease their property to an operating farm. Please contact the Assessor’s Office for further information.

If you feel you might be eligible for a STAR Credit, please contact the State using the numbers mentioned above. If you feel you might be eligible for any exemption in the Town of Vernon, please contact the Town of Vernon Assessors office located in the Vernon Town Hall (315-829-2587). The Vernon Assessor’s hours are Monday through Thursday 9am-2pm. **New Exemptions and exemption renewals for the upcoming year must be completed with the Assessor’s office before March 1 of each year.**

Codes Office News & Updates



The safety and well-being of the public is one of the primary ways that Codes Enforcement Officers impact communities. The duties of the Codes Officer are the prevention, detection, investigation and enforcement of laws regulating public health, safety and welfare. If possible, please call ahead and schedule a time to meet with one of our Code Enforcement Officers. They are not always in the office during business hours due to fire inspections, building inspections, other appointments, etc.

All of the following require building permits through our office:

- New homes including double wides
- Garages, Sheds and Carports
- New septic systems or changes to existing septic systems
- Remodeling interior or exterior, additions
- Decks, porches (including enclosed)
- Above ground, in ground pools and hot tubs/Jacuzzis
- Fences, ramps
- Chimneys, wood stoves, or outdoor wood/gas burning devices
- Ground and Roof mount Solar

What is a Code Violation?

Code Violations can come in a variety of forms. Some of them include:

The infographic lists the following code violations:

- Tall Grass and Weeds
- Tree Limbs and Brush lying on the ground on private property
- Trash and Debris on private property
- Insect, Rodent, & Mosquito Infestation
- Fence Maintenance
- Sign Code Violations (illegal garage sale signs, unauthorized commercial business signs)
- Zoning Ordinance Violations
- Substandard & Dangerous Buildings
- Illegal Residential Businesses
- Illegal Dumping Within a public street right of way, or public alley
- Junked or Abandoned Cars on public roadways & private properties
- Trespassing (entering an abandoned or unsafe structure)
- Presence of Infestation of rodent or insects in food establishment
- Complaints of Bats in Buildings
- Work without required building Permit
- Cleanliness of Food Establishments

Why is Code Enforcement Important?

Safety: Ensuring that properties meet safety standards reduces the risk of accidents, such as fires or structural failures, that can harm residents or visitors.

Property Values: Code enforcement helps maintain property values by preventing neglect and deterioration of properties in the community.

Community Aesthetics: A well-enforced code contributes to the visual appeal of neighborhoods, making the more attractive and livable.

Health: Regulations often include requirements for sanitation and pest control, contributing to public health.

TOWN OF VERNON NEWSLETTER – SPRING 2025 KEITH SCHIEBEL -- ONEIDA COUNTY LEGISLATOR DISTRICT 1

A year ago, Oneida County opened its doors to the world by hosting the 2024 International Women's Ice Hockey World Championships. The Adirondack Bank Center, formerly known as the Utica Aud, and the newly developed Nexus Center were the perfect combination to host the 10-team international world competition which was held for the first time in the U.S. since 2017. An estimated 70,000 visitors spend a combined \$3.4 million in consumer spending. But this story is not all about hockey, or even sports.

Oneida County has become a hub of commerce for central New York. As people visit here, stay here, shop here, and eat here, our out-of-county guests add to our economy through sales tax. Other events include soccer and lacrosse tournaments, basketball, and even trade shows add to our County economy. The largest source of revenue for operating Oneida County comes from sales tax with an estimated \$151 million for FY 2025, or more than 27% of our total revenue. The significance? Our Board of Legislators have adopted a budget for the **twelfth consecutive year** with **no property tax increase to the tax levy!** To the residents that own property, the County's property tax remains stable despite current rates of inflation.

The County's 2025 budget totals \$547 million. Of this, nearly 90% of the budget remains mandated services for our residents with health and human services comprising of the largest portion. And yet, a significant portion of our budget is dedicated to County roads and bridges. This past summer, two major local county roads, Peterboro Road and Marble Road, were ditched, repaved, and striped. Other county roads were sealed to extend the surface life. More than \$15 million has been appropriated in the 2025 budget for repaving, maintenance, and improvements of county roads and bridges. Other discretionary funds include the Sheriff's road patrol (this is not mandated), Office of the Aging including Senior Nutrition Program and Office of Continuing care, the Youth Bureau and support of libraries. Additionally, through state and federal grants, some of these discretionary programs generate additional state and federal grant funds for the County.

This past fall, I implemented a couple community town hall meetings focused on local and regional issues including a public safety town hall highlighting the County Sheriff's services and a housing forum exploring regional housing needs. These issues touch everyone in our communities and connect our local leaders to potential partners, services, or collaborators. Look for more such meetings to be announced.
